



The Clinical Practice Fellows Symposium at the national level is a full day event sponsored by the Association of Teacher Educators (ATE) during their annual conference. Clinical Practice Fellows serves as a forum of professional educators from both IHEs and P-12 schools collaborating to creatively think about what it means to provide high quality clinical experience in teacher education programs. This includes some emphasis on the importance of the relationship between P-12 schools and universities in both the preparation of new teachers and the ongoing professional development of veteran teachers.

Next year during our Fall 2019 Conference CCTE will be the first ATE state chapter to sponsor a Clinical Fellows Symposium at the state level. Today's session will be an introduction to the symposium concept by guests appearing virtually—including **Nancy Dean** (University of Florida), **Rebecca Burns** (University of South Florida), and **Robin Johnson** and **Kimberly Reinhardt** (Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi)—who have all participated previously in the program at the national level. These guests will share their experiences and the benefits they believe they received from being a clinical fellow. During the two-and-a-half-hour session attendees will learn about the format of the symposium and participate in a few activities that will serve as an introduction that we believe will spark interest among our membership to participate in the Clinical Fellows program during 2019, leading to a full-day symposium next October.
